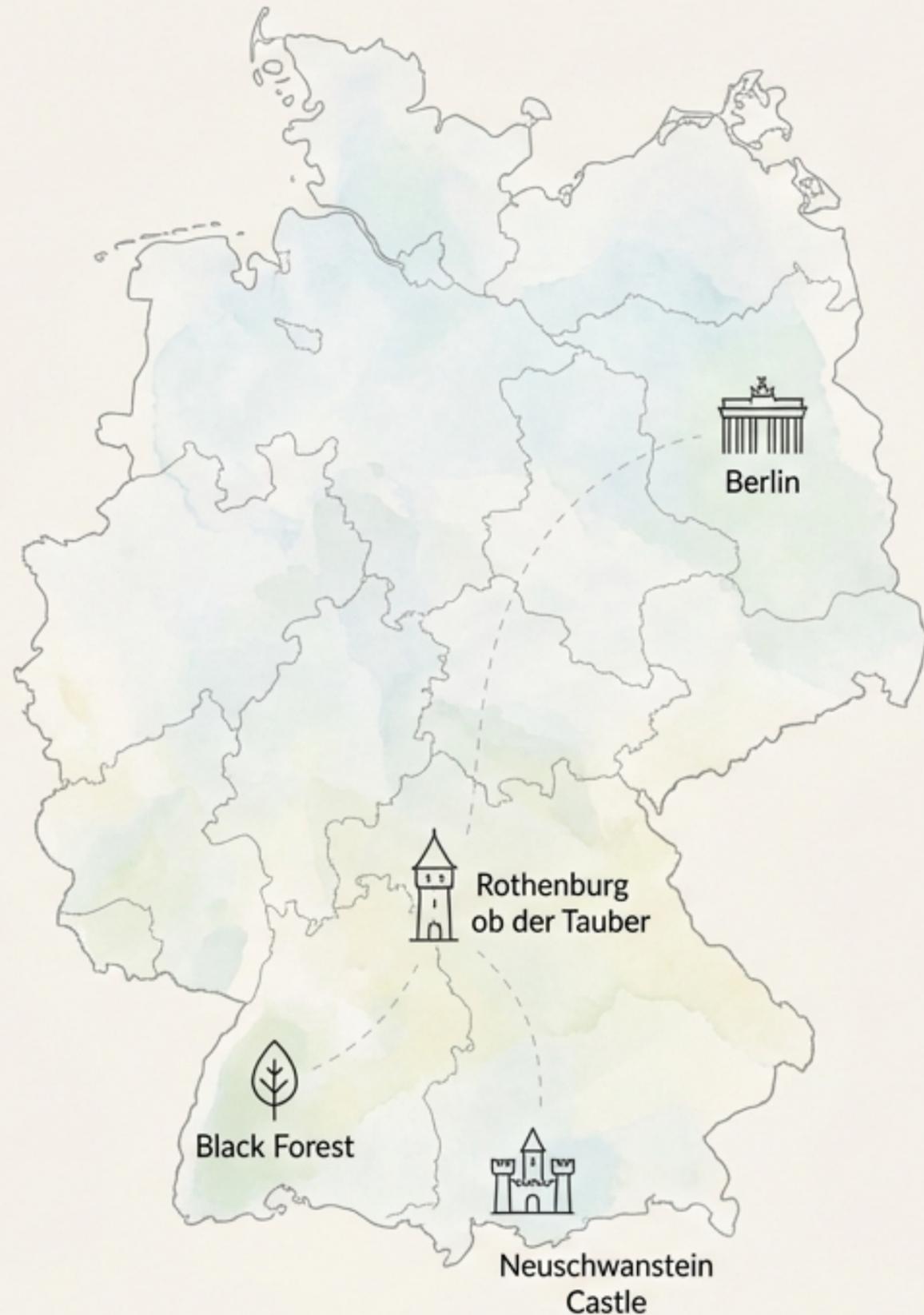

Rothenburg ob der Tauber

Berchtesgaden

Füssen: The 700-Year-Old Charm

At the foot of the Bavarian Alps, this medieval city feels like walking back in time with its cobblestone streets and classic German houses. The milky blue River Lech and the crowning High Castle add to its immense character.



Lake Constance: The Three-Country Lake

Germany's border with Austria and Switzerland is marked by Europe's second-largest lake by volume. Explore historic island towns like Lindau, first mentioned in the 9th century, or the picturesque shores of Meersburg.

The Essence

The fairytale castle that inspired Disney's Sleeping Beauty.

The Story

The most beautiful castle in Europe, construction began in 1869 as a retreat for King Ludwig II. Today, it receives over 1.4 million visitors a year, drawn to its romantic architecture and phenomenal alpine setting. It is a true storybook fantasy brought to life.

Key Fact: During WWII, the SS considered destroying the castle to prevent it from falling into enemy hands, but thankfully, this icon of German romanticism was spared.

A Trio of Legendary Fortresses



Hohenzollern Castle

Sitting perfectly on Mount Hohenzollern, this is the last of three castles built on the hill. Completed in 1867 as a memorial to the Prussian Royal Family, its impressive silhouette can be seen for miles.



Cochem Castle

Perched above the Mosel river, the original 1100s castle collected shipping tolls. Destroyed in 1689, it was rebuilt in the 19th century by a wealthy Berlin businessman and today overlooks the beautiful town of Cochem.



Eltz Castle

Just 30 minutes from Cochem, this immaculately preserved castle is a favorite for photographers, representing the quintessential "classic Instagram picture" of a German knight's castle.

Capitals of History & Rebirth



Berlin: The Reunited Capital

With a population of over 3.6 million, Berlin is a thriving city with a complex history. Once the most heavily bombed city in history and later divided by the Cold War, it is now a symbol of unity and peace, embodied by the neoclassical Brandenburg Gate.



Munich: The Bavarian Capital

Located 50km from the Alps, Munich was heavily damaged by over 70 air raids in WWII. Today, the city is restored to its former beauty. The central square, Marienplatz, with its stunning New Town Hall, is the vibrant heart of the city.

Port City Power & Financial Might



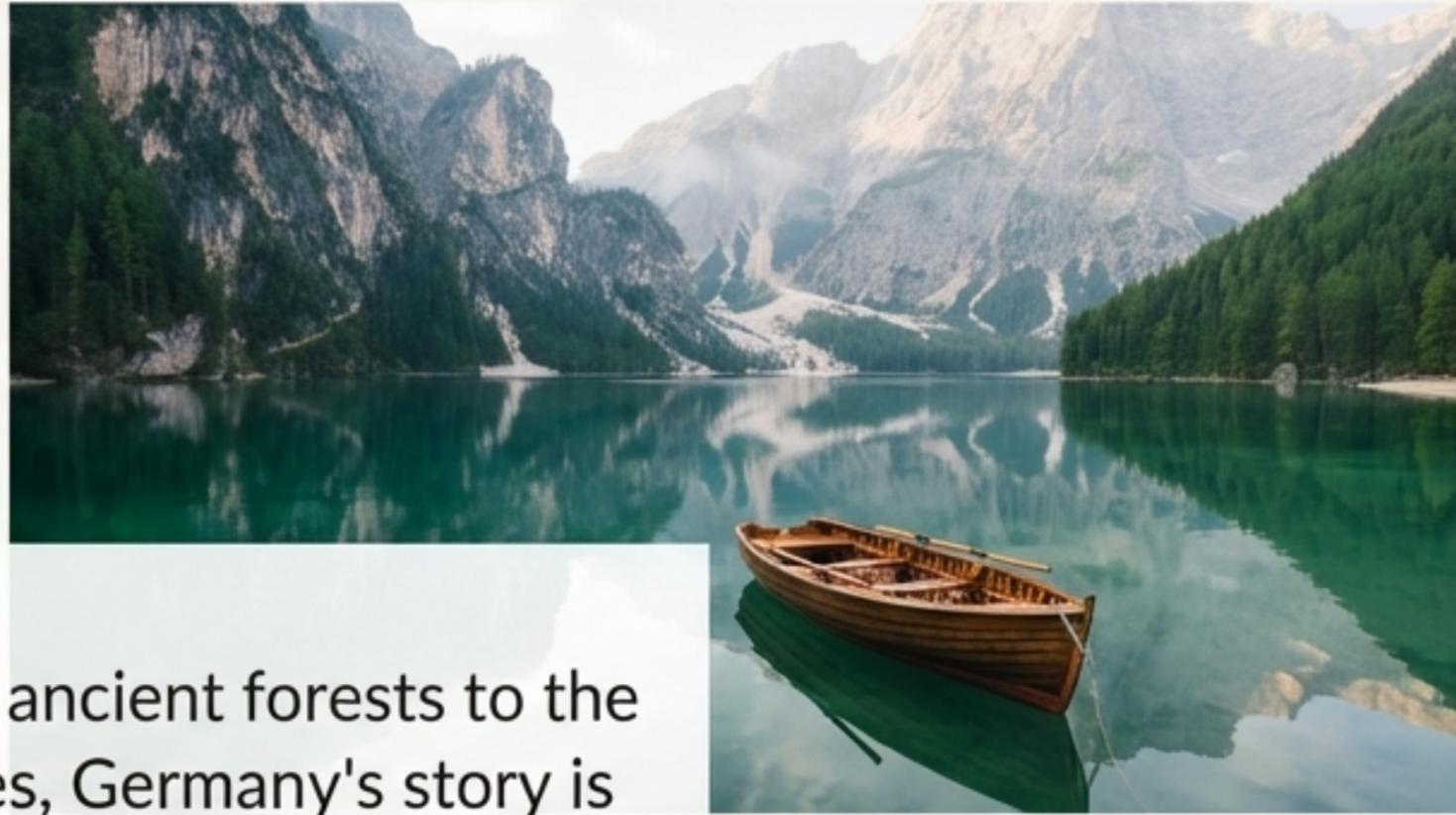
Hamburg: The Venice of the North
